Please share a little bit about a favorite class or project you developed in English about which you are particularly proud.

I loved "The Teaching of Writing" with Dr. Andrea Olinger! We were assigned a creative project that was supposed to describe or embody how we became the writer we are today. I built a house -shaped bookshelf (I designed the building plans myself, too), and filled its shelves with my favorite books from my childhood, teenage years, and college days. Instead of leaving them on display, I used a label maker and "retitled" each book with what it had taught me: writing styles, literary theories, storytelling strategies, and life lessons. We had a class gallery to display the projects, and I placed a potted house plant, with a hand painted a little sign that said "welcome home," next to my bookshelf. I was very proud of the work that I put into that project, and I thoroughly enjoyed the process of creating it and reflecting upon who I was as a writer.

Describe your career path. How did your English education prepare you for what you are doing today?

I am currently a graduate student at Vanderbilt University Divinity School. My plan is to stay in academia, as I hope to research, write, and publish about topics concerning justice, social ethics, and theology.
